


## Definition and Meaning

- Personal space is an area that humans or other animals, psychologically, feel and think theirs. (Edward T. Hall)




#### The Spaces Between Us by Michael Graziano

• Graziano states that our personal space is more like a second skin, and it might be something that we have to have and defend in order to sustain our lives, at least in a healthy way.



### Violation of Personal Space



## Violating Factors

- Our personal space could be violated not only by the physical appearance of the people around us but also by various factors that invade our precious space, such as cats, dogs, or whatever pet we have.
- Moreover, we may feel uncomfortable even by the presence of inanimate objects in our own room and think that they violate our territory.

## An Interesting Study!

 Alekseeva & Prokopeva (2015) studied adolescents whose personal spaces and other privacies are deprived by different factors. According to the results of this study, if the personal spaces and interests of the adolescents are violated, they are most likely to end up as angry and socalled "abnormal" in the future.

#### Purpose of our study

- This study aims to describe what personal space is, how Turkish EFL learners perceive the term "personal space", and to what extent it affects the English learning processes of Turkish EFL learners.
- Another aim of this study is to find out possible factors that violate Turkish EFL learners' personal spaces and the effects of these violations on their English proficiency levels.



Data Collection, Participants, Data Analysis

We prepared questionnaire consisting of 20 questions and shared on a Facebook platform named "100. Yıl Evleri".

The participants (n=45) of this study are METU students from all degrees and faculties whose L1 is Turkish.

The numerical data was analyzed via Google Forms.

#### Limitations


- We could not find many sources related to the effects of personal space on Turkish EFL learners as abundant in the literature as I expected.
- Also, the number and profile of the participants are not enough to generalize the findings.



#### Findings




Personal space matters for the EFL students at METU.




# Most of the participants had personal space.


10) During your primary, secondary and high school periods, did you have a private room where you spent time freely without being distracted by the people, pets, or objects?




Note that most of them lived in urban areas and had one or two siblings. And, their economic situations are "ideal".













• The option C represents that the participants were not aware of personal space!


#### Most of the participants stated they had an ideal personal space.



But the ones who had narrow personal space mostly blamed "parents".




We also asked about METU dormitories!




• Remember, METU is a university where medium of instruction is English!







Yet, most of them think that personal space affects EFL learning process.





• About 40-45% of the participants think that their English proficiency levels would not be different while the other 40-45% think the opposite.

## Discussion and Suggestions




#### More studies and more participants needed!

As this study was conducted with the participation of 45 EFL learners from METU, these findings do not reflect the precise effects of personal space on Turkish EFL learners.

Because METU is one of the "elite" universities in Turkey, and the medium of instruction is English, which is known by many of the students beforehand.

So, we need more information from various regions, age groups, state vs. private schools, etc. to be able to measure the real effect of this phenomenon.
